Best Targets in Doubles

When playing doubles, the best targets to hit at is over the net strap and at the T. This is the most consistent place to hit the ball. Largest real estate to hit toward and the lowest part of the net. It's a no brainer. Not to mention creating confusion for your opponents by hitting the ball through the middle of the court. I like to really focus my return of serves low over the net strap so I have a target to hit at. If I do this successfully, I know that the server's partner can't poach my ball. This will then allow me to come in and join my partner at the net.

Too often players change direction of the ball. The only two times you should change the direction of the ball is if you are close to the net and you get a high ball or if your opponent at the net is crowding the middle of the court trying to poach your ball, then a strong hit up the line will work.

Try this and win more doubles matches!

Final World Championship Report by Mike Tammen

I hit my first ball on the red clay when I was 23 and have spent the next 40 years trying to catch up to the ones that were born on this red stuff. I gotta say I am not a bad clay court player but it would appear I still have a lot of work to do....

Now I know some of you will want to debate this with me but in my opinion, after playing in this great event and after a long career of playing on all different surfaces and watching and loving most sports, there is nothing that is as artistic, graceful and athletic as watching a great clay court player do their thing...

I'm not sure my words do it justice but it's simply magnificent to see a 60 year old (or any age) sprint from side to side, sliding, recovering, making an adjustment on that terrible bounce, hit a recovery shot, knife backhand to backhand then sprint 25 feet forward because their opponent just hit a drop shot, slide another 8 feet, reach the ball just before it bounces for the second time and hit a drop shot back that barely clears the net for a winner. Spectacular!!, and that was just one point :) We get to see this point after point!

My path in this years individual World Championships was not so graceful but at least I did not fall. I played pretty well through the 4th round beating players from Portugal, Italy, and Mexico before running into Norbert Henn the #1 player from Germany. He took me out 6-2, 7-5. Yah he's one of those who was born on this stuff. That being said I played a good match and was serving for the second set at 5-4 but Norbert then found another clay court gear. So back to the drawing board for me.

Bill Moss made it to the quarterfinals before losing to former #10 singles and #1 doubles player Anders Jarred. Bill had match points in the 3rd before losing 6-0, 4-6, 7-5. It will take him a while to get over this one. My doubles partner Mike Fedderly lost in the quarterfinals to the eventual finalist. Mike had to retire after pulling a quad at 4-3 in the first. Stu made it the furthest getting to the semis and losing in three sets to the same Spaniard 6-4, 3-6, 6-1. Great effort by Stu!!!

The doubles was a different story. Seeded #1, we received a first round bye and played a good team from the Netherlands in the second round. It was a solid match for us and we won 6-2, 6-3. In the quarterfinals we played a team from Hungary. I did not know they were so good in Hungary. Another lesson relearned. Never underestimate your opponents. We won the first set 6-2. Then the Hungarians completely changed their tactics... They stayed back, started lobbing and being very patient...until they got their shot, usually a forehand, and then hit it as hard as they could which worked. They pulled ahead a break. A little bit of a wake up call for us. Then at 3-5 we broke back and pulled even at 5-5. Then to the tie break which we got behind 3-5 but were able to win the next 4 points and pull it out 7-6. Scary stuff because in the doubles tourney if you split sets, you play a 10-point match tiebreak and as you all know anything can happen in one of those. So, we were very happy to escape with a 2-set win. In our semifinal match we played a team from Great Brittan. Another match where it took a few games to settle in but we won the first set 6-3. Then in the second something changed again. Good adjustments by them got the Brits a 2-break lead so they are serving for the set at 5-2. A bit of nerves by them opened up the door and we somehow figured out a way back and won 5 consecutive games and the set 7-5. We just kept telling ourselves to keep working hard on every point and see what happens.

On to the finals. We played the #1 team from France and we had our best day of the tournament. Playing on the center court which was a thrill for me we won 6-0, 6-2. Enough said. My 4th World Doubles Championship, 3rd with Mike....




